achieved by Robert Rijnsburger. He was delighted to win the *Hans Minnee Challenge Trophy*, so much so that he was speechless when it came to the winner's speech at the prize winning ceremony. This however was not surprising giving the energy consumed by everyone needed to complete a round of 18 holes in these near-tropical

This year also featured the Nearest to the Centerline competition. Leo van Rijn played a marvelous T-shot of over 150 meters which landed within one centimeter of the centerline. This lead to speculations during the BBQ afterwards whether or not the centerline had moved during the afternoon but with a wind force of zero Beaufort during all hours of afternoon play the organizing committee did not face any complaints when Leo was announced as the winner of the F35 JSF model.

This F35 model was donated by Steve Netto who this year joined the

clinic due to an injury. The clinic

hosted nine participants this year which is a promising sign for the future. Winner of this year's clinic were Leo Staats and Vincent van Campen. Leo graciously accepted the *Golf for Dummies* book as
